ECS545: Evaluating Antipoverty Policies

## **Teaching objectives and learning outcomes**

The aim of the course is to introduce the students to the methods available for the ex post counterfactual analysis of anti-poverty programs. The emphasis is on the problems encountered in applying these methods to anti-poverty programs in developing countries, drawing on examples from actual evaluations. The course will consist of ten lectures over four days. The students will also be given the opportunity to present their own research.

Upon successful completion of this course the participants should be able to

- demonstrate a firm grasp of the relevant literature
- assess the pros and cons of different evaluation methods
- design the analysis of a specific anti-poverty program

**Topics:** Social experiments, Propensity-score methods, Discontinuity designs, Instrumental variables
